My TF is not yet ready to drive so I had a choice of driving a very nice TD or the 53 Y-type. The TD was a relatively new acquisition and needed to be driven to sort it out. If the weather held I was thinking of driving the TD.

The first week of April was in the 60's but the forecast for weekend was nothing but dropping temps. The decision was made and the Y-type was the car to be used in questionable weather.

Friday's forecast mentioned that the overnight temps would get down to 27 degrees and the high temps for Saturday was only in the mid thirties.. The start of the tour was about thirty miles away all the way across town from the shop where the Y-type is stored. Unfortunately my house is part way towards the starting point. It only makes sense that I drive the Y-type to my house and leave for the start from my house the next morning.

I was up and out of the house at 7Am. to get the start at the right time.

Driving a T car in the snow is another experience all together. During the 26 mile drive to the start I noticed that the mercury in the Moto Meter was not rising in the thermometer to indicate the temp. of the engine.



When I got to the start, I noticed that the snow on the bonnet and top of the car was still there, the engine and passenger compartments did not heat up enough to melt the snow. My attention then turned to the Moto Meter. That is when I discovered that the mercury was now visible at the very bottom of the edge of the Moto Meter. The longer that the car sat there without the engine running the engine would heat up and the mercury would rise. It wasn't that the Moto Meter was not working it was that it was so cold out the engine never got hot enough to register on the Moto Meter.


